- d) While donations are suitable for providing relief to the affected population, sometimes they may be used to abuse the affected population. Explain the circumstances under which donations may be sent back to the senders. **(4 Marks)**
- e) Explain any **THREE** guidelines to donors on sending donations. **(5 Marks)**
